Hello Friends:

I have an excerpt for you from a famous holiday work of literature. Do you know where it is from?

"He went to church, and walked about the streets, and watched the people hurrying to and fro, and patted children on the head, and questioned beggars, and looked down into the kitchens of houses, and up to the windows, and found that everything could yield him pleasure. He had never dreamed that any walk—that anything—could give him so much happiness. In the afternoon he turned his steps towards his nephew's house.

This is from *A Christmas Carol* by Charles Dickens. I don't know about you, but I love this story and love the movie adaptions of the story as well. My favorite film versions include the one starring George C. Scott (1984), the musical version with Albert Finney (1970), and the Muppet Christmas Carol (1992)! If you have watched these versions of *A Christmas Carol*, you probably don't remember seeing Ebenezer Scrooge attending Church Services on Christmas Morning. There is only one film adaption to my knowledge that includes this, being faithful to Dickens' original story.

In the 1999 version with Patrick Stewart, Scrooge is walking through the streets of London wishing everyone he comes across a "Merry Christmas." He hears a hymn being sung from a local church: "God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen." He is drawn in by the music and decides to go to the service. He is a fish out of water! He doesn't know that he is supposed to remove his top hat upon entering, but is kindly encouraged to do so. He finds an empty spot in an otherwise full pew and tries to sing but doesn't know the words. Thankfully, the person that is standing next to him shares his hymnbook and Scrooge, with the music in front of him, starts to sing with great joy and gusto! "O tidings of comfort and joy, comfort and joy, O tidings of comfort and joy!" It is a truly beautiful scene!

I hope and pray that we might have someone come into our sanctuary at Central this Advent/Christmas season. Maybe they will come not having been in church for a long time. Maybe they will come as one not being familiar with the traditions of our church or how we "do" church on Sunday. Maybe they won't know the songs we sing or when to stand or when to sit. It is my prayer that if we are blessed by the presence of a "Christmas Visitor," that we might be a welcoming environment, coming alongside that person, helping them to "get their bearings" in such a strange environment, and helping them to feel at ease. What a great Christmas Gift that would be for our congregation, to welcome in a new face for the purpose of worshiping the New Born King!

 - Attended PORTA Ministerial meeting.
 - o Regularly attends Food Pantry meetings.
 - o Bible study continues.
 - Special thanks to Linda Claussen and Deacons for making the wiener roast after church possible.

Administration Committee News

Financial

- Our income year to date is \$4,811.54 above budget and YTD expenses are below budget by \$8,680.48. Regardless of budget, our income, YTD, is \$8,970.67 lower than our expenses. We are on line to be negative \$10,000 this fiscal year
- Treasurer's report, General, Obligated Funds and MMF were reviewed by the Committee.
- Designated and Endowment Funds were also reviewed.
- Julie Wankel from Edward Jones attended our meeting and will be putting together proposals for our current investments. Several CDs come due prior to the end of the year and the Edward Jones rates look strong compared to local options.
- The checkbook balance, including Obligated Funds, is \$28,602.91, which is down nearly \$7,400.00 from the first of this year.
- 2025 Stewardship drive is nearing completion. We have received 22 pledges as compared to 29 in 2024 (not counting the 2 pledges from members that we lost this year) and total \$60,230 as

compared to \$80,884 in 2024. We have 8 potential pledges outstanding that could total \$10,000. There are two new pledging units, so far.

- 2025 MMF pledges have exceeded this year's pledges. We have 3 potential pledges outstanding and the new total should be over \$9,000 compared to \$6,860 this year.
- Work is ongoing on preparing our 2025 budget. The two areas that are potentially increasing are payroll (increasing by \$5,298.00, as being presented currently) and insurance (which is showing a 45% increase with Church Mutual or \$4,000). Steve has reached out to other churches to find out who they use for insurance and has a local agent getting us competitive quotes from multiple providers.

Catechism Corner

Catechism Corner From κατηχέω, ("to teach orally")

I thought it might be useful for us to review and reflect a little each month from a catechism used by the PCUSA. Hopefully this will serve a purpose in helping us think deeper about our faith and even inspire us towards a greater pursuit of Christian Theology grounded in Holy Scripture. I pray you find this new section in the newsletter helpful. I enjoy talking theology so come by the church if you have questions or thoughts about these!

The Study Catechism: Full Version Approved by the 210th General Assembly (1998) of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)

Question 70. What is the main difference between baptism and the Lord's Supper?

While I receive baptism only once, I receive the Lord's Super again and again. Being unrepeatable, baptism indicates not only that Christ died for our sins once and for all, but that by grace we are also united with Him once and for all through faith. Being repeatable, the Lord's Supper indicates that as we turn unfilled to Him again and again, our Lord continually meets us in the power of the Holy Spirit to renew and deepen our faith.

Acts 2:41 "So those who welcomed His message were baptized, and that day about three thousand persons were added."

John 6:51 "I am the living bread that came down from heaven. Whoever eats of this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give for the life of the world is my flesh."

Question 71. What is baptism?

Baptism is the sign and seal through which we are joined to Christ.

Romans 6:3-4 "Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into His death? Therefore we have been buried with Him by

baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we might walk in newness of life."

Question 72. What does it mean to be baptized?

My baptism means that I am joined to Jesus Christ forever. I am baptized into His death and resurrection, along with all who have received Him by faith. As I am baptized with water, He baptizes me with His Spirit, washing away all my sins and freeing me from their control. My baptism is a sign that one day I will rise with Him in glory, and may walk with Him even now in newness of life.

An Unlikely Health Champion

Someone once asked me who I would like to meet if I had the chance to meet a public figure. For many reasons, I said former president Jimmy Carter. In addition to what he accomplished as president, after leaving office he used his former position and his Christian faith to help live a life of service to his fellow man.

James Earl Carter Jr. (born October 1, 1924) is an American politician and humanitarian who served from 1977 to 1981 as the 39th president of the United States. Opposing racial segregation, Carter supported the growing civil rights movement. He created a national energy policy that included conservation, price control, and new technology.

Carter is a key figure in the nonprofit housing organization Habitat for Humanity. After leaving the presidency, he built homes in the aftermath of Hurricane Sandy. He also partnered with former presidents to work with One America Appeal to help the victims of Hurricane Harvey and Hurricane Irma in the Gulf Coast and Texas communities. In 1982, Carter established the Carter Center to promote and expand human rights; in 2002 he received a Nobel Peace Prize for related work.

A nongovernmental and non-profit organization, the Carter Center has helped to improve life for people in more than 80 countries by resolving conflicts, advancing democracy and human rights, preventing diseases, and improving mental health care. The Carter Center is a leader in the global effort to eradicate and eliminate diseases, including guinea worm, river blindness, lymphatic filariasis, and blinding trachoma. The efforts many times include health education and simple, low-cost methods.

One very successful effort has been the contribution of the Carter Center working alongside the World Health Organization to nearly eradicate dracunculiasis, also called Guinea worm disease. The incidence of this disease has decreased from 3.5 million cases in the mid-1980s, to 25 cases in 2016, and four in the first seven months of 2024, according to the Carter Center's statistics. From a young age, Carter showed a deep commitment to evangelical Christianity. Carter taught Sunday school at Maranatha Baptist Church in Plains, Georgia. As president, Carter prayed several times a day, and professed that Jesus was the driving force in his life. As of 2019, he was still teaching Sunday School.

Ham & Cheese Tortilla Roll Ups

The Cookie Rookie- Author Becky Hardin

Ingredients

16 oz. cream cheese (room temperature 2 bricks)

1.5 oz. Hidden Valley Original Ranch Seasoning Mix (1 packet)

1/2 cup shredded sharp cheddar cheese

5 flour tortillas

1/2 cup finely chopped ham

1/2 cup chopped green onion

Directions:

- 1. In a medium bowl, mix the cream cheese, ranch mix, and shredded cheese together.
- 2. Spread 1/5 of the cream cheese mixture onto each tortilla in a 1/4-inch layer.
- 3. Sprinkle each tortilla with ham and onion. Roll each tortilla tight to make sure the cream cheese binds the tortilla together.
- 4. Place in the refrigerator until fully chilled, about 1-2 hours.
- 5. Cut each tortilla into 1/2-inch wheels and serve.

Storage:

Store in an airtight container in the fridge up to 4 days or in the freezer up to 1 month.

Optional: Fresh or frozen cranberries, sliced apples, orange wedges, fresh mint leaves and cinnamon sticks.

Directions

In a large saucepan, bring the water, sugar and cinnamon to a boil, stir until sugar is dissolved. Chill. Just before serving, combine the syrup mixture, juices and ginger ale in a punch bowl or large pitcher. If desired, garnish with fruit and mint, and serve over ice with cinnamon sticks.
